


Miss Georgia is practicing the unit's vocabulary through the manipulative chart. "Where, oh where is sister hiding?" There she is! Well done!


NEIGHBORHOOD







A Visit to the Gerovassiliou Winery

On October 12, 2011 E3 went to the Gerovassiliou Winery. It was a beautiful, cool, sunny day. It took us about 50 minutes to get there by bus. We sang songs and we talked on the bus.

When we got there we saw the 560 hectare vineyard with yellow, red, purple, and green grapes. There were beautiful flowers all around. In the lower part of the market, there were many shops. The guide explained how the Romans spent their day and how they talked about their problems. Interview with Katie Kolar AES Fellow and Ms Camilla's ST3 class

Wednesday 16th November

Why did you decide to come to Greece?

I decided to come to Greece because I love working with children and I love travelling. Therefore, I thought it would be great to combine the two things and come and work at Anatolia.

What are the differences between Greece and the USA?

The USA is bigger than Greece. In the USA there are many different cultures and many different languages but Greece has one culture and one language.

What do you like about Greece?

I really love the Greek food, especially meatballs. We don't have much public transport where I live in the USA and I like the buses here. I think the bus service is very good and I like catching buses but at first I didn't know how to catch a bus.

Are junior schools different in the USA? How? Yes, junior schools are different in the USA. In the USA schools are divided differently, for example we have middle school which is for grades 6 to 8.

What languages do junior school students learn in the USA?

Students in the USA don't learn a language until high school in 9th grade, so I think what you do is pretty impressive and that you speak English well.

Are you learning Greek? Is it difficult?

I don't have any Greek lessons and yes, it is very difficult. The Greek alphabet is very different from the English alphabet. I have learnt a few words.

What languages do you speak?

I took French for four years in high school so I know a little bit of French but not as well as you know English.

Could you tell us something about the celebration of Thanksgiving in the USA?

Thanksgiving in America is mostly about family, food, and football - the three f's! We love getting together with our family and spending time with them and remembering all the good things in our life.

What other festivals and celebrations do you have?

We have Halloween, Christmas, Valentine's Day,





St. Patrick's Day, and 4th of July, which is American Independence Day.

What do like about working at the kindergarten and lower school?

I really like working with the children. I love being able to see their faces light up when they finally understand a word or sentence.

Where do you live in Thessaloniki?

I live above the "Rainbow Camp" office at Anatolia High School.

Do you like Greek food?

I love Greek Food! Meatballs, eggplant and souvlaki are my favorites.

What is American food like?

American food is from all over the world. We have Mexican restaurants, Chinese, Greek, Italian, Asian, and so on. We have many different choices, which I love!

What is your city like?

We only have about 2,000 people in my city so it is very small compared to Thessaloniki. There is also no public transportation like here and you need a car.

Could you tell us what you like doing with your family?

We love eating meals together, watching TV, going boating, playing board games and cards, and just talking with each other. We are really close and I love hanging out with my family.

How old are you? I'm 34 years old

Is your job easy?

It depends. Sometimes it's easy and sometimes it's not. It is often difficult, but the fact that it's very interesting makes it "easier".

Were you interested in making robots when you were a child?

Yes. But it was difficult so I couldn't manage to make robots.

Is it hard to make a robot?

Well, it depends on the application. If it's simple it is easy to make one and it takes about 8-10 hours. But if the application is complex, it may take even up to 2 years to construct the robot.

What does the biggest robot you have ever made look like?

It is an industrial robot and it's 4 meters tall and 18 meters long! It was able to identify and separate recyclable waste. I made it with a team of 8 other roboticists.

Have you travelled a lot and do you like travelling?

Yes, I have travelled a lot and when I have the time I still like to do some travelling.

What is your favorite robot's name?

Its name is "Banana Joe". It's actually smaller than my hand!

What is your favorite sport?

When I was young I used to play football in a team but now I love cycling!

Have you ever tried to do an extreme sport? No, I'm not that crazy!

Do you have a pet? No, robots are like my pets.

Where did you study Robotics? At Sussex University (BEng) and Reading University (MSc) in the United Kingdom.

When you were young, did you like to study your lessons? Yes, I was a good student. **Do you think that robots are your friends?** Yes. Actually there are some robots that are designed to keep company to old people and kids that have health problems.

Who is your favorite scientist?

James Dyson, the inventor of cyclone vacuum cleaners, a forward, out of the box thinker.

Have you ever worked with a very important person?

Yes, with Professor Kevin Warwick. He claims to be the first cyborg (half human half robot) when he surgically planted a system (electrodes array) in his nervous system to communicate with his computer. He was able to open doors, switch off his computer and control mobile robots by sending pulses down his nervous system.

How old were you when you worked with him? I was 24 years old

A VISIT TO THE WHITE TOWER

Last week our class went on a trip to the most famous monument in Thessaloniki, the White Tower. We had never been there before and we were looking forward to it. Let's talk about what we learnt, what we saw and what we did there.

When we arrived, we saw a giant building with a lot of windows. It had a huge door, too. We were amazed by its beauty. Unfortunately, it was raining, so we entered the Tower as fast as we could. A lady was waiting for us. She told us she would be our guide and started giving us lots of useful information about it. She started talking about its History and added that it wasn't so beautiful as it seemed.

The White Tower was built in 324 B.C. Long ago, it was a part of the Wall which protected the city from its enemies. When Thessaloniki was ruled by the Turks, it was called the "Tower of blood". The reason was that it was used as a prison and a lot of Greeks were killed there. Nowadays it is white because a man promised to paint the entire Tower in one day, so that they wouldn't kill him. The next day the Tower was white.

We couldn't believe our eyes. We thought that it was a simple ancient tower but it wasn't. There were six floors. There were screens all over the walls which showed videos from the past years. There were touch screens in every room and we could choose which part of the history we wanted to read about. Our favorite place in the Tower was the mirror room. Many people say that when you look at yourself in that mirror, you see the real you. In one of the rooms the seats looked like an ancient theater. We sat there and we watched a video about how the sports teams of the city were established. Next, we moved on to a room full of tiny prison cells. That's where they kept the Greeks who were fighting for their freedom. We were all very moved in that room. In another room, there was an



interesting exhibition. It was a collection of old coins which were used by the population of the city. We went up and on the last floor they were showing videos presenting different kinds of food from different countries. There was also a small shop where you could buy little souvenirs.

After seeing the inside of the Tower, we reached the top of the tower where the view was breathtaking. You could see the whole city from up there. We stood there and admired the beautiful scenery of Thessaloniki. Here and there some signs were hanging with information about the history of the port.
